PROGRAM BASICS

Brief Program Description:

The program would show the many unique ways that the civil rights movement shaped Atlanta. Using the sets in the Gather Round Exhibit. The Program would explore what life was like during this time using a series of pre recorded clips that would be played by the education staff member that would oversee the experience. This experience would be a museum theater piece.

Educational Objective:

To inform the students on the impact of the civil rights movement on the city of Atlanta as well.

PROGRAM DETAILS

Detailed program narrative:

The first 30miniute of the program will be an overview of the civil rights movement to make sure that all the students are on the same level when it comes to the civil rights movement. The next hour will be an immersive experience that explores the civils rights movement in Atlanta. They will explore sit ins that happened in Atlanta. For this the lunch counter in the Gather round exhibit may be used to film clips of a staged sit in or historic clips could also be used. After this the event leader will explain what sit ins were used for and what some of the protesters went through. They could also talk about SNCC and how they moved their headquarters to Atlanta and what all the group accomplished. The students will then be shown a speech done by martin Luther king. The event leader will talk about how influential he was, especially in Atlanta. Finally, the program would conclude with a 30min time for the students to ask questions to the event leader.

Program Schedule:

10am-1030am- main event lead will lead an overview of the civil right movements so that the students have a general background of the movement.

10:30-11:30- Main Program starts and runs for 1 hour

11:30-12- this time will be available for students to ask questions

Program set-up (include technology for virtual programs):

The program would take place on Zoom. All students will be muted and have cameras turned off until after the program is over. During the last 30 minutes the student will be allowed to unmute and ask questions.

Technology needed for the program: computer, cameras, microphone and green screen.

Number and type of Staff Needed (Include Planning and Production/Day of Event):

For planning and production we would need a team of 5 staff members. We would need 2 staff for script writing. 3 staff for filming and editing.

On the day of the event three staff members would be needed. One staff member to lead the event, one staff member to run the technology aspect. One staff member monitors the chat with the students.
